Referendum and Senate Vote Information

Who Can Vote?

A person is eligible to vote if they are:

- (a) at least 18 years old,
- (b) a Canadian citizen, and
- (c) a resident in Alberta, where the person's place of residence is located in the local jurisdiction on election day.

Permanent residents of the summer village may designate the summer village as their place of residence for the purposes of voting in the senate election and referendum vote. Permanent residents of the summer village do not need to be named on the certificate of title as the person who owns property within a summer village in order to be eligible.

Electors may only cast their ballot in the senate election and referendum vote once. Electors that reside in more than one municipality must designate one residence as their place of residence for the purposes of voting, considering the following (in order of precedence):

- The address on their AB Driver's License or Identification Card,
- The address where their income tax correspondence is delivered, or
- The address where their mail is addressed and delivered.
- dress where their mail is addressed and delivered.

Notice is hereby given:

- A. That an election will be held for the election of a Senate nominee for the purposes of the *Alberta Senate Election Act*;
- B. That a vote of the electors will be held on the following referendum question(s) under the *Referendum Act*;
- Should Section 36(2) of the *Constitution Act, 1982* – Parliament and the government of Canada’s commitment to the principle of making equalization payments – be removed from the Constitution?
 - Do you want Alberta to adopt year-round Daylight Saving Time, which is summer hours, eliminating the need to change our clocks twice a year?

Voting will take place on the 18th day of October 2021, between the hours of 10:00 am and 8:00 pm.

Voting stations will be located at:

Gull Lake Community Hall, 27 Lakeview Ave.

In order to vote, you must produce identification for inspection. The identification must be one or more of:

Any of the following documents that has the voter’s name and address on it will be accepted as valid proof:

- Identification issued by a Canadian government, whether federal, provincial or local, or an agency of that government, that contains a photograph of the elector and their name and current address.
- Bank or credit card statement or personal cheque.
- Government cheque or cheque stub.
- Income or property tax assessment notice.
- Insurance policy or coverage card.
- Letter from a public curator, public guardian or public trustee.
- Pension plan statement of benefits, contributions or participation.
- Residential lease or mortgage statement.
- Statement of government benefits (for example, employment insurance, old-age security, social assistance, disability support or child tax benefit).
- Utility bill (for example, telephone, public utilities commission, television, hydro, gas or water).
- Vehicle ownership, registration or insurance certificate.

A letter or form (attestation) confirming that the person lives at the stated address will also be accepted as valid proof. The letter can be signed prior to the vote by any of the following:

- authorized representative of a commercial property management company;
 - authorized representative of a correctional institution;
 - authorized representative of a First Nations band or reserve;
 - authorized representative of a post-secondary institution;
 - authorized representative of a facility that provides services to the homeless; or
 - authorized representative of a supportive living facility or treatment centre.

If a voter's identification shows a post office box number as the address instead of a residential or legal address, it can be accepted as verification of current address if it is in reasonable distance to the voting jurisdiction. The address does not have to be in the voting division or ward.

As required by section 53 of the *Local Authorities Election Act*.
