

Did you know a call to 911 may not actually be covered by your insurance? When you call 911 for fire & emergency response, Lacombe County invoices the Summer Village directly for these costs. According to the Fire Protection Bylaw (318 s.14), these costs are then recovered directly from the resident by the Summer Village

Doug Francoeur

Doug is a third-generation resident of the Summer Village of Gull Lake. Doug has spent many summers enjoying the lake and all it has to offer, and has even assisted in hosting the Family Day Fly-in. Professionally, Doug is an airport consultant, having worked for both the Edmonton & Calgary Airports Authorities. Doug is in his third term of office, having been first elected to council of the Summer Village of Gull Lake in 2020.



Dog Control Bylaw - Summer Village of Gull Lake

Reminder to residents of the Summer Village of Gull Lake

Due to increasing volume of residents and pedestrians over the summer months, the Summer Village office would like to remind residents that ALL dogs are required to remain on leash AT ALL TIMES while off your property.

Section 3 of the Dog Control Bylaw 327-05 states that no dog is permitted to be running at large within the corporate limits of the Village, nor can they "chase or otherwise threaten a person or other animal, whether on the property of the owner or not".

Please be mindful of your pets, and remember, it's better to be safe than sorry!

Fire Aware: Understanding AB Fire Ratings

Fire Advisory - Issued when conditions are dry & the risk of wildfire is increasing. Allowed:

- Backyard fire pits using clean dry wood.
- Campfires on private land and in campgrounds
- Propane/gas fire pits and BBQ's

Not Allowed:

Fireworks

Fire Restriction - Issued when fire hazard conditions are serious.

Allowed:

- Wood campfires in designated campgrounds, on private land, and in backyard fire pits
- Propane/gas-powered appliances (fire pits, stoves, BBQ's)

Not Allowed:

- Fireworks
- Fires on public lands, including random camping and backcountry areas
- Burning of brush piles, debris, or windrows

Fire Ban - Issued when the fire risk is extreme & resources are limited Allowed:

- Propane/gas-powered appliances with an on/off switch Not Allowed:
- All open fires, including backyard fire pits and campfires
- Charcoal BBQ's, tiki torches, fireworks, etc.

Have you reviewed your insurance coverage to ensure it covers potential emergency response costs?

Our Fire Protection Bylaw 318, "All costs and expenses incurred ... shall be charged to the owner of the parcel of land on which the fire occurred or in respect of which the action was taken".

Contact your insurance provider to confirm coverage for these invoices, should the need arise.

UNDERSTANDING THE COSTS BEHIND FIRE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES RESPONSE INVOICES

Here's an example on how Lacombe County invoices for fire and emergency services response calls. Let's say Mr. John Ratepayer had a fire on his farm involving a small outbuilding that caught fire. Lacombe County Fire Service responded to this fire with three fire apparatus.

- Fire Engine 2 hours
- Tender 2 hours
- Brush Truck 2 hours

The fire crews responded and began operations to extinguish the fire. After the fire was extinguished, the crews looked for hot spots and ensured not only the fire was out, but that it would not rekindle as well.

The invoice would look similar to the amounts in the table below.

DEFINITIONS OF EQUIPMENT USED AT CALLS

Rescue Truck: A rescue truck is a specialized emergency response vehicle primarily used for rescue operations, including vehicle extrications, medical emergencies, and technical rescues like confined spaces. It typically carries minimal or no water but is equipped with specialized rescue gear, hydraulic tools (e.g., "jaws of life"), ropes, airbags, lighting equipment, and medical supplies.

Fire Engine: A fire engine is the primary response vehicle designed to handle structure and other on-property and motor vehicle fires, rescue operations, and emergency medical calls. It typically carries between 500 to 1,000 gallons of water, hoses, pumps, ladders, rescue gear, and essential firefighting tools.

Tender: A tender, also known as a water tanker, supplies large volumes of water to support firefighting operations, particularly in rural or non-hydrant areas. It usually holds 1,500 to 3,500 gallons or more and includes equipment to quickly transfer water to other apparatus.

Brush Truck: A brush truck is specifically equipped for fighting wildland or brush fires in rough terrain or areas difficult for larger apparatus to access. It carries approximately 200 to 500 gallons of water and specialized wildland fire fighting gear like hoses, hand tools, and portable pumps.

FIRE & EMERGENCY COSTS

Do you know if you're prepared to cover the costs of fire and emergency services?

Lacombe County is reminding residents about potential costs associated with fire and emergency services. Under our fire response policy, residents and businesses will be invoiced for fire and emergency service responses.

These charges are typically covered by insurance—but it's **YOUR responsibility** to confirm you have sufficient coverage **BEFORE** an emergency occurs.

FIRE INVOICES



Lacombe County residents and businesses will be billed for fire and emergency responses if equipment is dispatched to their property.

ACCIDENT CHARGES

Vehicle owners will be invoiced for motor vehicle accidents requiring fire and emergency services within Lacombe County.





CHECK YOUR INSURANCE COVERAGE

These charges are typically covered by insurance if you have the right coverage.

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
